## **ESTABLISHMENT – MAYOR/DEPUTY MAYOR**

1. To consider the situation with regards to proposals for wind turbines in the local area and agree the Town Council position on such proposals - Mayor.

The Powys County Council position statement is provided for information.

Powys is abundant in opportunities to generate renewable energy, and is proud of the part it already plays in decarbonising the Powys economy and tackling the causes and impacts of global warming impacting Powys communities.

Powys concurs with the Welsh Government that as much renewable electricity as possible should be generated and consumed locally.

Powys supports local ownership of energy generation and distribution designed to support the wider Powys community transition towards low carbon energy use reflecting the circular economy.

Powys supports the principles for generating green hydrogen locally alongside other energy storage and redistribution measures acknowledging the capacity constraints of the local distribution network.

Powys calls on the Welsh Government to pause its open invitation to submit any more DNS applications for major on-shore wind farms in Powys until:

- the Government clearly sets out how it will ensure that cumulative impact (including the associated infrastructure) across all outstanding DNS applications is to be properly managed and considered. The existing case by case basis cannot keep pace with the rate at which competing applications are emerging, leaving communities unconvinced that the declared “presumption in favour” of large-scale projects will adequately protect their interests which is undermining confidence in the impartiality of the planning system.
- the Government sets out a clear and coherent plan for upgrading the power transmission and distribution network, confirming their commitment to undergrounding new lines of 132kva and above, and demonstrates how electricity generated can be accessed and used by local residents.
- the Government demonstrates how it intends to align the two consenting regimes for wind farms and transmission lines and not permit more energy parks to be granted planning consent unless and until there is demonstrable evidence that they can be implemented and connected up to the grid.
